Our Mission

To assure that the identity of the school stays true to our values and standards of excellence, we ask that all publications and marketing materials adhere to our branding guidelines, which are given in detail both in our website and the Ionia High School Graphic Identity Standards Manual.

All IHS Identities are to adhere to our primary and secondary color profiles without exception, details of which are located in the Color Profile page. The seven identities of Ionia High School are available for limited customization, with most of them available in multiple colors and backgrounds. The Bulldog, Block I, and Cursive I identities give the option of adding text for individual school organizations to make them their own. The Ionia Public Schools Identity is included on the website for download and use as well.

While many logos are available for use by school organizations and faculty, the school has coalesced around its primary identities of the Bulldog and Block I, which are the defining symbols of our school and are to be used in the vast majority of situations.

As an added incentive for faculty and students to adhere to our graphic standards, high resolution PNGs of every acceptable variation of every identity are available for download at dfuller0.wixsite.com/ihsbrand, including the colors of our Color Profile. Each picture file includes a background from our Color Profile to ensure they are not put on an incorrectly colored background.

By practicing discipline with our public image and presenting a consistent brand, implementation of the Ionia High School Graphic Identity Standards will allow us to build and maintain an identity worthy of our school and our community, one that shows the world who we really are.

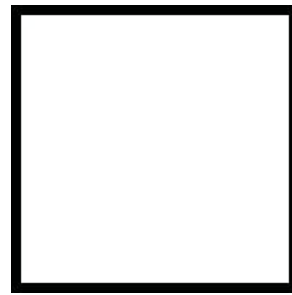
Color Profile

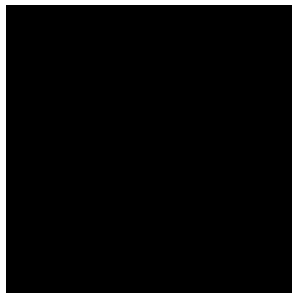

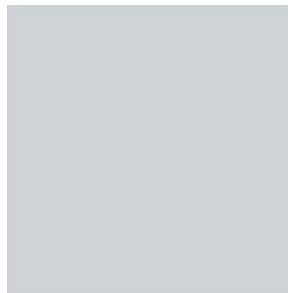

Bulldog

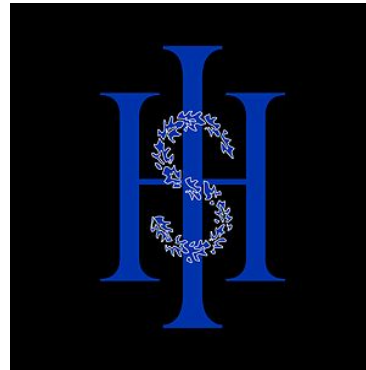
IHS Lockup

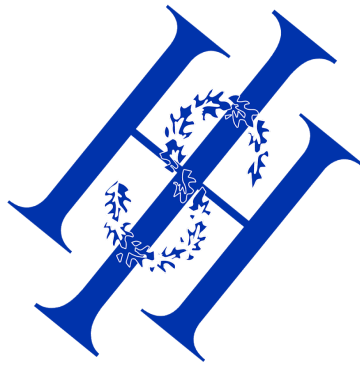

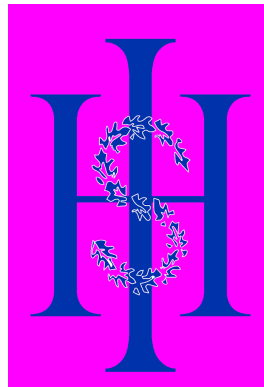

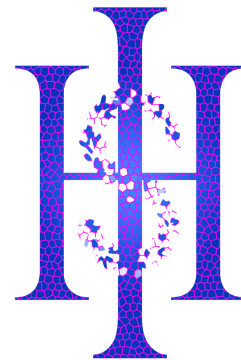

IHS Word Mark

IHS Emblem

Created around 1951, the IHS Emblem is our oldest identity. Each element within our emblem is symbolic in character. The column used in our emblem, known as the Ionic Order, was created in the 6th century BC. The three columns within our emblem signify the achievements of the ancient Ionians. With that in mind, the columns of the "H" represent liberty and freedom joined together by a philosophy strong in justice, culminating in the central "I" column as the ultimate attainment of knowledge with culture and skill. The oak leaf chain which forms the "S" by entwining itself around the central column is a familiar symbol of tradition of long standing in the Ionia High School. For many years, when the Ionia High School was located on Union Hill, the junior class constructed and carried an oak leaf chain to honor the senior class at graduation ceremonies. Our emblem is an expression of all these attributes, which are the heritage of Ionians; its purpose is to inspire loyalty, pride, perseverance and honor within the heart of every Ionia Bulldog.

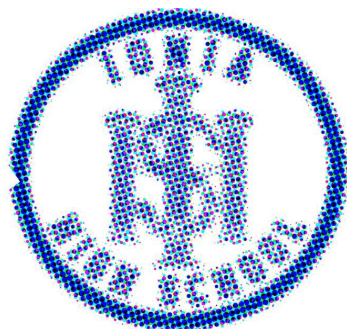

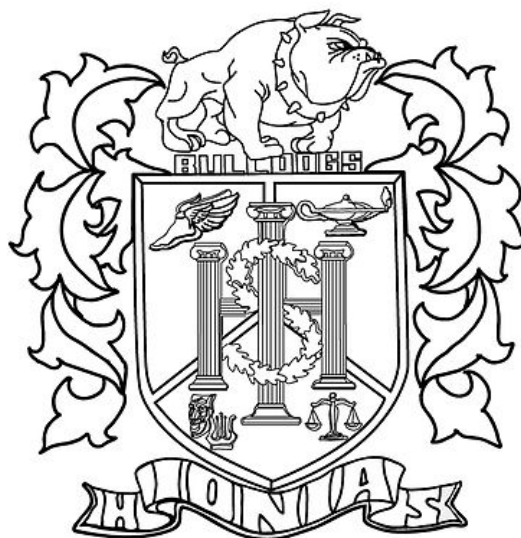
IHS Crest

The IHS Crest is another logo that has recently returned to prominence. Our Crest consists of a shield that includes the Winged Sandals of Hermes (athletics), the Lamp of Knowledge, the Mask and Lyre of the Arts, and the Scales of Justice, symbolizing important aspects of life at IHS. In reverence for our crest and similar to many university seals, only the IHS Principal, the IPS Superintendent, and the IPS Board of Education are permitted to use this identity.

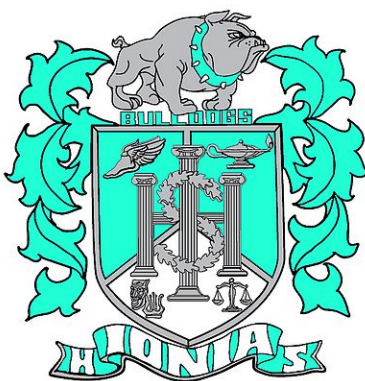

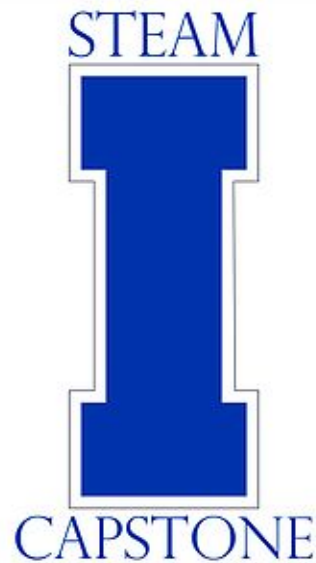

Project 2020

The STEAM Capstone Class of 2020 was the first class of its kind at Ionia High School. The culminating course in the STEAM pathway, students are already well-versed with FANUC Robot technology, 3D printing, and graphic design software when they enter the class. The STEAM Capstone allows participants to use their new skills to solve a real-world problem while collaborating with a business partner in the community. This year, the goal of the course was to standardize the use of all IHS Identities (logos), give guidelines on how and when certain ones may be used, and create a unifying school image that would bring the school community closer together. The underlying issue was the largely unregulated use of school identities and the use of unofficial graphics in their place. To solve this, the course participants partnered with IHS Principal Ben Gurk to update existing school Identities and create internet and print based platforms to provide people access to the correct Identities and inform them about their correct usage.
